1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Govt. College, Narnaul, established in 1954 and recognized under Sections 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act, now stands as a premier multi-faculty, multidisciplinary, **co-educational** institution affiliated with Indira Gandhi University, Meerpur accredited B+ in its 2nd Cycle of Accreditation by NAAC. It is one of the leading colleges in the state dedicated to holistic development, situated in Narnaul, in the district of Mahendergarh, south Haryana. **Narnaul** is a city, a Municipal Council, and location of headquarters of the Mahendragarh district in the Indian state of Haryana. Since its inception, the college has been committed to nurturing young minds and removing socio-economic barriers and discrimination.

The college is administered by the **Haryana Government** (https://haryana.gov.in/) through the **Department of Higher Education**, **Panchkula** (https://highereduhry.ac.in).

College has lush green campus sprawling over 25 acres. The built-in area encompasses six separate buildings that comprises of well-furnished airy teaching blocks, library, the administrative offices and a state-of-the-art multipurpose auditorium with a seating capacity of about 700.

The library lends itself to a quiet and reflective ambience for the students. It is well-stocked with plothera of books and various e-journals.

The college currently offers 12 full-time PG courses, 7 UG courses, and 1 PG diploma course, along with certificate courses. We have a highly qualified and dedicated faculty guided by the code of ethics who are committed to imparting value-based education to its students. All stakeholders work within the institutional policies and practices so as to satisfy the Vision and Mission of the college.

The College is committed to making students conscious of their social responsibility through outreach programmes organized by NSS, NCC, YRC, subject society, sports clubs, etc. to enhance students' social awareness and sensitivity towards the upliftment of the underprivileged sections of society.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- 1. Multi-faculty, multidisciplinary institution with multiple programmes and courses.
- 2. The college has a lush green campus sprawling over 25 acres with 3 teaching blocks, 2 seminar halls, one multipurpose hall, a girls common room, a sports ground, a resourceful library, laboratories, etc.
- 3. Various scholarship schemes are available for the SC/BC/ Meritorious students to overcome social inequality and reward achievements.
- 4. The college offers 12 PG courses, 7 UG courses, and 1 PG diploma which is one of its kind in the entire locality, with an intake of 1910 students every year.
- 5. Highly qualified and competent faculty (more than 60% of the staff on rolls are Ph.D).
- 6. Galaxy of notable high-profile alumnae, including NRIs, IAS etc.
- 7. Regular seminars, expert talks, workshops, and other academic activities are organized to supplement the college's teaching.
- 8. Our students bring laurels by consistently achieving top university positions in academics, sports, and other extracurricular activities.
- 9. The college is entrusted with organizing zonal-level and district-level events like essay writing competitions, science quizzes, science exhibitions, and so on.

Institutional Weakness

- 1. **Limited academic flexibility** The college being affiliated with Indira Gandhi University is bound to follow the curriculum devised by the University and state government norms and therefore does not allow full academic flexibility in designing the course content, which is usually not in sync with the latest global standards.
- 2. The paucity of non-teaching staff puts an extra burden on teaching staff. They have to perform additional institutional duties apart from the academic ones.
- 3. The institution's location in a socially and geographically disadvantaged area in south Haryana prevents its students from having the same exposure to the industry as students in Delhi NCR.

Institutional Opportunity

- 1. Implementation of NEP-2020 would offer us opportunity to revise our academic strategy.
- 2. More MoU with the industry and academic institutes.
- 3. Contribute towards social and economic upliftment of students and citizens at large.
- 4. Contribute towards nation-wide development and promote the Indian Knowledge System.
- 5. Motivating faculty to prepare MOOC courses for SWAYAM/NPTEL.
- 6. Introducing new skill-based courses from time to time to meet the industry requirements.
- 7. Strengthening placement and research activities.

Institutional Challenge

- 1. Inculcate more employability skills under the existing academic framework.
- 2. To implement Choice Based Credit System and NEP 2020 Academic bank of credit framework.
- 3. Mushrooming of private institutions in the region poses an academic challenge to the institution.
- 4. It is a challenge to obtain the Grants and Funding for various activities.
- 5. Most of the students hails from rural and low to mid socio-economic background. They need additional nurturing & care compared to peers.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution is affiliated with Indira Gandhi University, Meerpur and it strictly adheres to its norms and guidelines. The college offers 12 PG Courses, 7 UG Courses and one PG diploma.

The college adheres to the Complying with the Elective course system and curriculum designed by the affiliating university is delivered through a well - planned and documented process.

The **Indira Gandhi University's Academic Calendar** provides guidelines for the admission schedule, teaching days, Continuous Internal Evaluation. Hitherto institution functions as per a structured Academic Calendar which is an important document that helps in planning and execution of curricular, summer and winter vacations, teaching terms throughout the session. The Calendar is open to revision in response to students' requests, preferences and situational contingencies.

Several members of the college faculties are on the members of Board of Studies, the Academic Council and university court of Indira Gandhi University, Meerpur and help to bring about required changes in curriculum from time to time.

Members of the faculty are also engaged as university paper setters, paper evaluators and mentors to bring about academic excellence and student satisfaction and to ensure a holistic and value-based education.

Many courses offered by the institution involve experiential learning, which entails project work, fieldwork, and internships at different levels.

Student assessment is based on Comprehensive Continuous Evaluation through class tests, assignments/presentations, peer evaluations, GDs, etc. Students have to go through internal as well as external evaluation process. In addition to this, seminar and self study is part and partial of the curriculum for which separate awards are given to the students.

Critical issues related to Ethics, Gender and Human Values are an integral part of the teaching and learning process in various courses and are also addressed through various activities of clubs and societies. All students need to appear in compulsory environment studies paper.

Feedback from various students, parents, alumni, and parents is collected and analyzed from time to time, and the suggestions, where possible, are subsequently implemented in the relevant area to enhance academic excellence, which is available on the institution's website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- 5. Students are nurtured by teachers to improve critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving attitude.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college is primarily an undergraduate college. The college is thriving for excellence in research and offers ample opportunities for co- and extra-curricular activities for students. Throughout the year extension activities are held in collaboration with the neighbourhood. Government College, Narnaul promotes the creation and transfer of knowledge through research, extension activities, outreach programs, skill enhancement and collaborations. The college does not have any recognized

research center of the affiliating university or any other agency. However, the college encourages research by providing all possible facilities in the form of laboratories and library to the teachers and students. Students get a basic knowledge of research work by doing practical and projects in the college laboratories and field work. College provides ICT facilities like computers, internet/Wi-Fi connections to the researchers. Numerous books and research papers have been published by the faculty with publishers of national and international repute. College works

towards promoting the culture of innovation and entrepreneurship among students and faculty by organising workshops, training programmes, expert lectures and interactive sessions with successful personalities. The College supports collaboration with industry and other educational institutes. Faculty members participate in collaborative research with faculty of other educational institutes and publish research papers. Students participate in industrial and academic training for better research and job prospects. Apart from academic activities, students are engaged in sports, cultural, religious and social activities through different programmes round the year like Blood donation camps, Swami Vivekanand Jyanti, Gandhi Jayanti, Shaheedi Divas, NSS and NCC camps, Van Mahotsav week, Tree plantation Drive, cleanliness drive, rallies and poster making competitions on gender issues etc. All these programs lead to holistic development of the students so as to make them good and responsible citizens of the country. Students are encouraged to take part in rallies, processions for creating awareness among citizens on various issues like, social, environmental, religion and health. To prepare the students for better career opportunities in future. NSS units of the college organize lectures on cleanliness and hygiene, healthcare, dowry system, female foeticide, environmental issues etc. NSS camps are organized in rural areas or in localities outside the city in which persons from rural background, slum areas also participate in deliberations. NSS units organize training in basic first-aid and literacy campaigns. People and students from rural background participate in such programs.

The student is the first and most important stakeholder in the teaching-learning process whose needs vary due to the presence of various heterogeneous parameters. Hence, Student Support assumes paramount importance for the effective dissemination of quality education.

Government College Narnaul, prioritizes students as the top priority and has a well-defined mechanism for student support and progression. Several cells and committees, comprising teachers and student representatives monitored by the Principal, are effectively functioning to ensure students' academic, psychological, physical, economic, social and spiritual welfare and development. Students play a significant role in academic and administrative bodies. The college provides different kinds of stipends and **scholarships** (SC/BC, merit) under various schemes of the Government of Haryana. Financial assistance is given to the students under the "Earn While You Learn" scheme for working in the college for fixed hours. Many activities are organized by different departmental subject societies and cells on the college campus for holistic development.

Several extracurricular and sports activities are being conducted to facilitate the holistic development of the student to emerge as a socially matured individual. Students who excel in extra-cultural activities are provided cash prizes and awards, along with appreciation and merit certificates. There is a Career Counseling and Guidance Cell/ Placement Cell, which guides and instructs students about career opportunities and competitive exams. It provides information related to admissions and jobs through its display on the notice board. It also acquaints them with various career options through participation in job fairs. Academic support for slow learners and advanced learners exists, along with guidance to face several competitive examinations. Many students of the institution have qualified competitive examinations like NET, JRF, SSC etc and also progressed to higher levels of learning or employment.

The college has a registered alumni association that is active and frequently brings the alumni together through reunions and invitations as resource persons and chief guests. The alumni of the college have been leading figures in the political, administrative, sports, and academic fields. Over the last five years, alumni have contributed lakhs of rupees for financial assistance to college, enhancing amenities to the students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

Governance, Leadership and Management Since we are a government institution, we don't have much decentralization power, but the Department of Higher Education gives sufficient participative management freedom to the Principal, the academic head of the College, to fulfil the vision and mission of the institution. Academic responsibilities are fairly divided among all the staff members. Committees are appointed for the

academic year's various academic and co-curricular activities.

College empowers all its stakeholders with functional autonomy in decisionmaking, planning and institutional goal attainment by incorporating policy of Decentralization and Participative Management. Heads of various Departments and Conveners of various cells/committees/subject associations enjoy full operational autonomy for carrying out the activities of their departments/cells/associations. Headsof the departments are free to plan and execute the academic activities in consultation with the faculty of the department and approval by the Principal. The list of committees is displayed at the beginning of the year on the staff noticeboard. This ensures transparency in policy execution. The responsibilities are communicated to the faculty members through regular staff meetings. The Principal of the college holds regular meetings with the teaching and non-teaching staff. Various issues were discussed in these meetings before arriving at a final decision. The heads of departments monitor the functioning of the multiple departments. Participative decision-making ensures the total participation of all the people concerned. Theofficeadministration of the College is headed by the Principal, under whom there are Superintendent/ Deputy Superintendent, Assistants, Clerks and other Class IVStaff members. Thus, decentralising the institution's departments and personnel helps improve the quality of its educational provisions. The Administration is always open to discussion with the teaching and non-teaching staff, which encourages the staff's involvement to enhance the effectiveness and efficiency of the institutional process. Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:

Most of the programmes offered by the College are multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary programmes: 1. B.A.: Every student has to choose two languages including English and Hindi/ Sanskrit. (Chemistry, botany, Zoology) (geology, botany, Zoology). 3. All Undergraduate students who do not study Computer Science as a subject have to opt for Compulsory Computer Education during First Year of their course for which certificate is awarded to them. 4. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) has been implemented in all Post Graduate programmes. Students have to choose foundation and open elective courses from pool of subjects offered by other departments.

2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Govt. College, Narnaul is a Government College and the structural academic decisions like implementation of Academic bank of Credits (ABC) could only be take either by the Department of Higher Education College or the Affiliating University (IGU, Meerpur). The College merely implements the academic decisions taken and policies framed the department of Higher Education. Haryana is the front runner state as far as implementing of NEP-2020 is concerned. During the year 2021, Hon'ble Chief Minster of Haryana has formally launched the NEP-2020 implementation in the State. The department of higher education has also taken concrete initiatives in this direction and progress made by every institute is being monitored digitally. Principal Secretary Higher Education, Haryana have issued action points vide letter no. Cord.SPL/01/2022 dated 02.11.2022). 5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Program outcomes and course outcomes are well defined in all PG courses curriculum. Whole academic activity is planned in accordance with them. Affiliating university has also integrated program and course objectives in some of the programmes whose syllabus is available on

university website. Mentor remain in regular touch with the students. They constantly monitor the progress of their mentees. All course syllabi have been designed with due consideration to social needs at large so as to apply the spirit of NEP. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Govt. College, Narnaul being affiliated to Indira Gandhi University, Meerpur, Rewari and follows the University norms regarding Internal/external Assessment.

The weightage of internal assessments and external exam (end semester exam) for each program are clearly mentioned in the ordinance & Scheme of Examination for that the program and the same is available on the website of affiliating University. The teacher shares this information to the students via whatsapp Groups along with discussion in orientation programme at the start of session.

- As per university norms internal assessment weightage is 20% of Maximum marks for particular course of a particular program.
- For All Programs the breakup of Internal Assessment as prescribed by the University is as follows: 50 % through Class Tests; 25% through Assignments, presentations and class response and remaining 25% through Attendance.
- Teachers make the students aware about the Internal Assessment Evaluation Criteria at the outset
 of the session and the internal assessment the evaluation is done through various methods like

- The end semester examinations are scheduled by University and date sheets are shared to students via university portal as well as via notice board and whatsapp sms in students groups.

• The practical examinations are conducted by external examiners from the panel decide by university and within the time frame defined by University.

Results of the assessments are communicated to students and answer sheets are discussed for improvement in the performance in final examinations.

Awards of Internal assessment are uploaded on the university Portal for timely declaration of results.

Grievances Redressal Mechanism:

At Institute level, Registrar and house examination committee, comprising of a senior teachers as Registrar & convener and other teaching and non-teaching staff as members, is constituted to handle the issues regarding evaluation process. The teacher distributes evaluated answer sheets to students, and any clarifications or grievances are addressed by the teacher. The students are informed about their performance in the internal assessment. If any discrepancies like mistakes in evaluation process, mark allocation etc. is noticed by the students, the concerned teacher will resolve the discrepancy, and the necessary corrections will be made.

If a student is not satisfied by the process followed by the concern teacher, then he/she may represent the same to the HOD concerned. If the problem is not resolved the matter is forwarded to Registrar and Principal of the college for the final decision. All such representations are taken positively and treated with priority.

Students who participate in state/national level sports/cultural events or represent college at university/interuniversity or higher levels through NSS/NCC/YRC/Sports are given additional time to submit assignments and appear in class test.

The grievances regarding university examinations are forwarded to the University through university clerk of the college.

The entire mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent and resolved within the bounded time as per University norms.

Response:

The Government College Narnaul stands as a beacon of academic excellence, equipped with comprehensive infrastructure and state-of-the-art facilities that foster a conducive environment for teaching and learning. As mandated by statutory bodies, the adequacy of infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching and learning is critical for educational institutions to ensure a conducive environment for students' academic growth and well-being. These minimum specified requirements typically encompass several key areas:

1. Classroom: 46 (Forty-Six) Classrooms at Government College Narnaul are designed to facilitate interactive and engaging learning experiences.

Each classroom is designed to accommodate approximately 80 students, while lecture theatres boast a seating capacity of 120. Among the 46 classrooms, some are equipped as smart classrooms, featuring interactive classroom teaching (ICT) and projector facilities. All classrooms are well-ventilated with ample lighting and fans.

1. Laboratories: The college features specialised laboratories tailored to various disciplines, guaranteeing that students acquire hands-on experience and practical exposure to complement their theoretical understanding. With 21 laboratories dedicated to science- and technology-based programmes, these fully equipped facilities enable students to conduct experiments and practical sessions effectively.

The Department of Geology at Govt. College, Narnaul, features the Microscopic Lab and the Geological Museum. The microscopic lab is well-equipped with sophisticated instruments, including petrochemical microscopes, ore microscopes, and micropaleontology microscopes, facilitating the study of Earth's materials. The lab has approximately 100 thin sections of earth material and about 500 hand specimens. The institution has two physics and three chemistry laboratories, each with various apparatus and chemicals. Additionally, there are three geography labs, two botany labs, two zoology labs, one lab each for mathematics and English, and four computer labs, providing diverse and specialised spaces to support various disciplines.

1. Computer Equipment: Aligned with the technological progress of the 21st century, Government College Narnaul has made substantial investments in state-of-the-art

- computing equipment. Modern amenities encompass well-equipped computer labs, a digital lounge, projectors, smart classrooms, and a conference hall. Additionally, the administrative block is furnished with the latest computers and printers to facilitate efficient working, while the automated library enhances operational efficiency for the benefit of students. The college had an advanced biometric attendance machine for staff and instructors to monitor.
- 2. Sports Facilities: The institution boasts a sprawling sports complex established in the 1970s. This complex includes well-maintained sports fields (track for 400 metres and 100 metres) and courts for football, basketball, tennis, and athletics. This space accommodates games like chess, table tennis, and carom. Additionally, outdoor games like cricket and volleyball are facilitated on designated grounds.
- 3. Cultural Facilities: The institution's cultural committee, renewed annually, provides a vibrant space for students to showcase their talents in music, dance, drama, and various art forms. With a 500-seat capacity, the auditorium hosts cultural events, workshops, and performances. The college has two conference halls for cultural activities.

The Government College Narnaul library is a knowledge repository, hosting an extensive collection of books, journals, and digital resources. As a central hub for research and self-study, it offers students a rich reservoir of information to enhance their academic pursuits.

This well-furnished facility is designed to meet students' educational and informational needs, offering a diverse range of reading materials categorised by author and subject. Students can borrow books for onsite reading or studying at home. With a spacious environment accommodating up to 50 students at a time, the library provides a tranquil setting for an inspiring, informative, and engaging reading experience.

The library is further enhanced by implementing Software for University Libraries (SOUL-3.0), an advanced integrated library management software that automates various housekeeping operations. This software efficiently records book issuance, maintains student data, and provides access to academic journals, periodicals, research papers, and e-books, facilitating the pursuit of knowledge by both teachers

and students.

Over the past five years, the library has received an annual grant to cultivate reading habits among students. By effectively utilising these funds, the library prioritises the interests of students. Notably, grants of 2,97,158/- (2018–19), 6,21,206/- (2020–21), and 5,83,867/- (2021–22) were utilised to acquire books, bookcases, tables, magazine stands, printers, UPS, DVDs, and automation equipment. In the latest grant of 93,310/- for 2022–23, the library has judiciously invested in a steel bookcase, further enhancing its resources to benefit the student community.

Internet connectivity is facilitated through Bharat Sanchar Nigam Limited, ensuring reliable access for the entire college community. A comprehensive LAN network seamlessly interconnects various departments across the campus, providing teachers with uninterrupted internet access. The campus also boasts a widespread Wi-Fi network, offering convenient connectivity for faculty and students.

Dedicated technical staff (lab assistant and instructor) are employed to meticulously maintain the hardware and information technology infrastructure on campus. The college strongly emphasises staying abreast of evolving technologies, as exemplified by its regular updates to IT facilities. Over the past five years, the college has expanded its computer inventory, reinforcing its commitment to technological excellence. 50 MBPS of bandwidth is available for internet connections on the college campus.

Each department has essential IT infrastructure, including computers, printers, scanners, photocopiers, projectors, and speakers. Smart classrooms featuring interactive boards, LCD projectors, internet

connectivity, laptops, and speaker systems are accessible throughout the college. Multimedia projectors are readily available, and multipurpose and seminar halls are equipped with LCD and ICT tools.

The installation of CCTV cameras contributes significantly to the collective sense of safety and wellbeing for students and staff. In emergency scenarios, the recorded footage aids authorities in making wellinformed decisions and enables swift responses to incidents. Regular maintenance and updates to the CCTV infrastructure are integral to its functionality, ensuring optimal performance over time. As technology advances, the college's commitment to leveraging CCTV technology reflects a dedication to creating a secure and conducive learning environment for all academic community members.

The college provides a Digital Lounge with nineteen computers to cater to students' needs. Each student is allocated a 45-minute slot for internet browsing, especially for viewing and completing competitive examination forms. This approach not only aids students in saving money but also optimizes their time.

E-Digital Studio, established as a specialized initiative at Government College Narnaul, records lectures, especially during challenging situations like the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the studio facilitates recording interviews with distinguished personalities at Govt. The college, Narnaul, and Edusat facilities have been functioning since 2012. It started with the display of satellite-based video lectures on the projector screen. Since 2020, the facility has been upgraded with an interactive flat panel.

In adapting to the digital era, the college has launched an official YouTube channel showcasing students' activities, orientation classes, and talents. Teachers successfully utilized the Zoom platform during the challenging pandemic to conduct webinars and facilitate various academic and administrative-level online activities.

Advanced connectivity, a robust information policy, and meticulous maintenance by dedicated technical personnel characterize the college's IT infrastructure. The institution's proactive approach to IT updates underscores its commitment to providing a cutting-edge technological environment, enriching the overall college experience for students, faculty, and staff.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1

The institution has performance appraisal system, effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff and avenues for career development/progression

Response:

Being a government institution, the college abides all government rules regarding welfare schemes:

- The facility of **L.T.C** (**Leave Travel Concession**) is available to both teaching and non-teaching staff members.
- Haryana Government gives various allowances like Children Education Allowance, House Rent Allowance and Medical Allowance to all the employees.
- All regular employees are given duty leaves for attending **Orientation, Refresher and short-term courses** offered by HRDCs along with Duty leaves and Study leaves for various career advancement programs.
- Maternity Leave for 6 months and child care Leave for a maximum of two years can be availed by the female staff. In times of Covid-19, provision of isolation leave (7 days) was made for affected employees.
- In unfortunate circumstances **miscarriage leave** can also be availed.
- The male staff is eligible for 15 days of **paternity leave.**
- In addition to these there is a provision for **cashless medical facility f**or chronic diseases and medical reimbursements are given to employees as per Haryana Government rules.
- Free medical facility is ensured on campus through the availability of an exclusive medical room.
- Besides the above welfare schemes, wheat loan is also available during the season for non-teaching staff.
- Festival advance along with special allowance is also availed by the employees.
- These facilities are availed by class IV employees only.
- The government has formulated a comprehensive procedure for the annual appraisal of the faculty. **Annual Confidential Report (ACR)** is the tool of performance appraisal.
- The ACR Performa, which is the record of the yearlong activities together with their results, is filled by all faculty members. This was earlier done manually but since 2020-21, it is being done online through MIS Portal.
- The Principal verifies and grades the performance and sends it to the higher authorities.
- For career advancement scheme the college scrupulously follows a yearly self-appraisal system wherein the teachers are provided with an Academic Performance Indicator (API) criterion based PBAS Performa which is verified by the IQAC and the Principal.
- APIs are submitted to the DHE office Panchkula whenever the teacher is eligible for the next grade.
- The concerned head of the departments evaluate the non-teaching staff on the basis of their enthusiasm, sense of responsibility, punctuality, behavior and attitude for teamwork and write their ACR

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Proper utilization of grants and resources is ensured through the joint efforts of the **Principal, Bursar and conveners** of various committees. State Government, UGC and University norms are followed for all purchases. Effort is made to direct all purchases through GEM Portal. The institution has formed a purchase committee for the purpose and every purchase is done as per Haryana government financial norms. The bills are presented by the concerned committee to the college Bursar who after perusal recommends it to the Principal (Drawing and Disbursing Officer). The bills are then submitted online to Haryana Government treasury for clearing. The transactions are fully cashless, and money is transferred through online mode. All scholarship payments are also made through DBT (Direct Benefit Transfer) mode. The college maintains a cashbook in which the entire details of income and expenditure are recorded. External audit of Local Funds (Amalgamated fund, Sports fund, NSS fund etc.) and Government Grants is conducted by two main agencies: Auditors from Local Audit Haryana Panchkula and Accountant General, Haryana respectively

Gender Disparity and Reservation

Fully aware of their **rural and socio-economic background**, the college has a robust Institutional mechanism to actualize its goals of gender equality and works ceaselessly to mitigate gender disparity. The college starts its pivotal role of mitigating gender disparity by offering reservation in admissions to U.G./P.G. classes to students belonging to SC/OBC/PH and EWS Categories. The girl-students are familiarised with the different cells and Activities undertaken in the college. Such programmes instil a sense of confidence in the newcomers and prepare a perfect Platform for them to choose activities of their preference to further the cause of holistic development. **Most of the students come from weaker section of the society.**

Counseling

GC Narnaul recognises that counselling is essential for students to navigate these demands and achieve their academic potential. In keeping with its mission to provide for the all-round holistic development of women students, our institution offers formal in- house counselling. This counselling is free and open to all students and staff, and complete confidentiality is maintained. Some recurring student concerns flagged by the College Counsellors are Time, Stress, Relationship Management, Family Problems, Body Image, self-confidence, Career Counseling and Teething Problems faced by first-year and outstation students. The institution also has a robust Mentor-Ward Programme that complements the teaching-learning exercise, and every student is paired with a faculty mentor, thus allowing them to reach out for individual sessions for counsel. Various talks on Gender Sensitization are organized from time to time. This has helped students understand the significance of counseling, work on their fears and anxieties and achieve their best in curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Earn While You Learn Scheme

Earning while learning mechanism is another vital tool for the girl-students to empower themselves.

Providing financial assistance to the poor and needy students from SC and OBC categories is another critical measure the institution took to empire the girl students. Another essential feature adopted by the institution to bring about gender equality is waiving tuition fees for UG students. From 2023-24 onwards, this facility has been extended to all PG students, irrespective of their income category. A significant hurdle the girl students face, most of them hailing from rural areas, is the cost of commutation from their homes to the college. To address this problem and to mitigate their travelling expense, a bus-pass facility is provided to the girl students, and almostgirl students are availing themselves of this facility. This measure of the college is among the most significant and influential mechanisms to empower girl students because easy and free accessibility to transport facilities ensures unhindered education to girl students and paves the way for their empowerment.

Awareness of Laws

The college makes the girl-students familiar with the existing laws and remedies available to them from all types of exploitation, whether physical, sexual, economic or caste and gender-based. The legal cell of the college keeps on holding. In seminars, eminent lawyers are invited to impart the girl-students' legal knowledge that can be used to thwart any exploitation. Through such workshops, they are also sensitised towards female-facticide, anti- dowry, and domestic violence laws. Competitions are also held under the aegis of the legal cell to strengthen their awareness of their rights.

Cultural Activities

The cultural activities hosted by the college and teams sent by it to different colleges for the participation of girl-students in cultural activities help them ward off their inhibitions and open new vistas for them. Different clubs have been formed in the college, and various activities viz. Sports, cultural, red ribbon club.

Vocational & Self Defense Training

The women's cell of the college organises "Self-defence Training classes" to infuse a sense of security among the girl students. Another significant initiative in the direction of women's empowerment taken by the women's cell pertains to organising tailoring and knitting, embroidary classes. These classes/workshops help the girl-students learn new skills which will prove handy to them to become self-reliant and self-employed. The cell also arranges lectures of specialists such as gynaecologists and sensitise them about the various health issues relating to the menstruation period, slain diseases, etc. The cell also ensures that vending machines efficiently, and the tendency of using unclean clothes during the musteration cycles by some of the girl-students belonging to rural and marginalised groups is curbed. With the help of specialist doctors and NGOs, the girl-students are also motivated to shun fart foods and adopt-healthy and nutritious diets.

The Placement Cell of the College

the Placement Cell is working in the institution, and it serves as an interface between the students and the employer. The Placement Cell also organises various seminars, workshops and extension lecturers.

Mentoring

Mentoring benefits all students. For some students who may be experiencing social isolation, mentoring can be a much-needed emotional and social support. For other students experiencing academic challenges, it can be an effective strategy for building a new or renewed love of learning and literacy. The college has assigned duties for the teachers as Mentors for a specific group. These mentor groups have played a significant role in:
